



Christmas Angels All Accounted For!

Thanks to our wonderfully giving Holy Spirit parish, all thirty-five Christmas Angels have been removed from the Angel Tree! Remember to bring your gifts for the angels back to the church by Sunday, December 10. Be sure the gifts are clearly marked with that angel's initials and number.

If you weren't able to select an angel — or even if you did— Operation Santa also needs your help. Operation Santa supplies food for hungry school children in Madison County. This is the third year we have been asked by Mars Hill Baptist Church to help out with the project. Counselors from each public school in the county identify approximately sixty children who are food insecure. They receive hot meals when school is in session but will not have sufficient food to get them through the two-week winter break.

Mars Hill Baptist provides toys and food for a family Christmas dinner, but Holy Spirit Church tries to supply as much food as possible for the children to prepare easily on the other days of the winter break. Our Villager Initiative budget and a grant from Thrivent Financial has allowed us to make a good start, but we need you to bring the following to church by Friday, December 15: big jars of peanut butter, big boxes of cereal, cans of soup, ravioli, etc., boxes of macaroni and cheese. Thanks for your generosity! "Tis the Season!"

OUR BELOVED MEMORIAL GARDEN

For many gardeners winter is the down time. Weeding stops for a while, and although amazing things are happening underground, no one can see them. But this gardener thinks winter is the most creative time! It is Advent in our Garden at Holy Spirit, and both wonderful and magical things are happening.

First, the Vestry has approved the Memorial Garden Team's request for Phase One of the Three-Year Memorial Garden Plan. Come January, we will have the funds to install a handrail leading up from the parking lot to the level pathway, enhancing access and safety on that slippery slope. We'll install a small sign indicating the Garden lies ahead. We will attempt to lift the stones creating our Celtic design, although we've been warned that raising the stones could prove difficult. As always, we'll continue to weed, fertilize, and treat the soils with organic nutrient-rich food so that in the spring we all may enjoy hundreds of tulips bursting forth in red and yellow. Already in progress are dozens of daffodils and several native plants happy to be in our soil. The large stones have been recently weeded and are clear for sitting.

Phase Two of the Memorial Garden Plan will add to the native planting. We will fill the pathway with fine gravel for proper drainage and more secure footing in damp weather. The path will be edged so the gravel doesn't float away. Two shade trees will be planted, and new benches will line the side where there is now only one bench. We need that extra seating for services as well as when folks visit the garden to pray or meditate.

Phase Three will add seat cushions for our amphitheater, a storage bin, and wireless speakers for the services and occasional music. Capping off the entrance to the space will be a simple wrought iron arch. A portion of the funding in this phase will be dedicated to creating a design plan for steps and railings leading down from the church to the garden.

And finally, the Memorial Garden Team would very much like to establish a Memorial Garden Endowment Fund. That fund would allow routine yearly maintenance and occasional tree work to be handled without impacting the Parish budget.

All these ideas and plans have been at work lovingly under the surface, just like a winter garden. No doubt some plans will change over time, and the new Landscaping Committee will have their contributions to make. Nonetheless, I thought everyone would like to have a glimpse of what's been "cookin'." We are small in number but fiercely dedicated to this beautiful space where more and more members of our Communion of Saints reside. By all means join us as we make "safe the paths of the Lord" this winter.

December's First Sunday Offering Goes To Homeward Bound

HOMeward BOUND is a nonprofit organization with the goal of ending homelessness. It follows the best practice model of Housing First, the most effective, cost-efficient, sustainable, and humane intervention for homelessness. People experiencing homelessness are quickly housed and given support and resources to maintain housing stability. The success rate of Homeward Bound's housing programs is impressive: of the more than 1400 people they have housed, 89% remain in permanent housing.

Homeward Bound also operates a Day Center in Asheville. The Center offers services such as showers, phones, storage, a mailing address, and a safe place. The Day Center often serves as many as 200 homeless people a day. ECHS has an opportunity to help the Day Center by donating warm socks, hats, gloves, and cough drops.

Another program of Homeward Bound is Room in the Inn, which serves homeless women, twelve at a time, who for a variety of reasons can't stay at a shelter.

Room at the Inn partners with faith communities taking turns hosting the women for a week at a time, providing all of their meals, shelter, and overnight accommodations. Holy Spirit has participated with the Room in the Inn program for several years, partnering with Weaverville Methodist and Weaverville Baptist churches. This year ECHS did hosting in March and November.

Please help this valuable program however you can, by contributing to the first Sunday offering, donating warm items to help the homeless population survive winter, or participating in our Room in the Inn week next spring.

An Important Letter From David McNair

Dear Church of the Holy Spirit,

For the past eight months our church has prayerfully discerned whether or not the Holy Spirit is calling us at this time to offer Sanctuary to our undocumented immigrant neighbors. At our meeting Tuesday, November 14, the Vestry unanimously made the following decision:

“We, the Episcopal Church of the Holy Spirit (ECHS), declare ECHS a Sanctuary Support Congregation. Also, we commission a Task Group to assess the feasibility of ECHS becoming a Sanctuary Host Congregation.”

This process of discernment has sought to be inviting and inclusive of all our members and those associated with our congregation. We have aimed to respectfully and carefully listen to one another and to consider all expressed views and opinions regarding whether or not to offer Sanctuary in light of our calling to be faithful disciples of Christ and to live more fully into our Baptismal Covenant.

Under the leadership of a Vestry-appointed Sanctuary Discernment Team (Mark Holland, Barbara Moloney, and Bob Warner) we have had three congregation-wide meetings, an educational Immigration 101 presentation and forum led by Marisol Mimenez, and six small group discussion/listening sessions. In addition, members of the committee met with Bishop Jose McLoughlin to apprise him of the process and enlist his support for whatever the congregation decided to do.

Also, members of the congregation were invited to participate in multiple Immigration Law workshops, Immigration education forums and Sanctuary Movement meetings.

Currently in Western NC, only one congregation that owns a building, The Unitarian Universalist Church of Asheville, has declared its commitment to be a Sanctuary Host Congregation. Therefore, the decision of our church to become a Sanctuary Support Congregation means that we will be supporting that congregation in its efforts to be a Sanctuary Host Congregation. The scope of our support will depend on the persons in our congregation who agree to volunteer in yet undetermined ways. As of now, our becoming a Sanctuary Support Church does not include financial support from ECHS but this may change upon further action of the ECHS Vestry.

The Sanctuary Task Group that will be commissioned by our Vestry to assess the feasibility of ECHS becoming a Sanctuary Host Congregation will, at a yet undetermined date, report back to the Vestry and the ECHS congregation with a detailed feasibility report. At that time the Vestry will make a decision as to whether or not we will declare our church a Sanctuary Host Congregation. The Vestry and I are committed to keep you abreast of the work of the Task Force, its pending report and of any new developments regarding ECHS involvement in the Sanctuary Movement. We also welcome your continued input and conversation as we continue to discern our role and commitment.
